Meanwhile, The Hive, our place-based collective impact initiative in Mount Druitt, has driven systemic change—improving access to health and early education for children and advocating successfully for state-wide reform. Programs like CUBS and the Willmot Paediatric Clinic are now embedded in government systems, showcasing what is possible when community-led solutions are scaled for lasting change.

READY TO READ



The Imagination Library is a proven, community-based initiative that provides one age-appropriate book each month to children from birth to age five. By providing books directly into homes and offering reading tips, the program encourages shared book reading—a key factor in early literacy development.

Putting a book in a child's hands opens a whole new world for them. It's a proven step towards opening the door to knowledge and opportunity, sparking curiosity, and building lasting family bonds.

In 2024, United Way Australia concluded a comprehensive global study of the Imagination Library, demonstrating how the program builds children's early literacy skills and fosters their love of reading.

THE IMAGINATION LIBRARY IN ACTION

Tamworth (NSW) has become Australia's largest literacy laboratory, testing an approach to home reading that is changing children's lives.

Since 2019, more than 98% of children born in Tamworth have been enrolled in the Imagination Library.

By participating in the Imagination Library, families, public libraries, health services and early childhood education services in Tamworth have created an entire community dedicated to building children's literacy.

Since 2019, the children in Tamworth have been read to more often, for longer durations and have collected more books in their homes than the average Australian child.

Through shared book reading with a caregiver, these children are more likely to know letters and words, and to show emerging literacy skills, by the time they are three years of age.



THE IMAGINATION LIBRARY - RESEARCH FINDINGS

The data we collected in Australia and around the world reveals the powerful impact of the Imagination Library in creating a love of reading in the family home.

We know that children in the Imagination Library:

more likely to be interested in books, after just 12 months in the program

are significantly more likely to be read to per week

THE HIVE



The Hive is the backbone organisation for a place-based collective impact initiative in Mount Druitt, western Sydney.

The Hive aims to ensure that all children in postcode 2770 start school well.

We partner with residents and with 30+ organisations to identify local priorities and collaborate on innovative solutions. Working together, we design and deliver 'social incubators': innovations that address the gaps in local early childhood systems and seek to improve outcomes for children.

We also amplify the learnings from our community development work and the outcomes of our social incubators, by advocating to governments for broader systems-level and policy changes.



CASE STUDY: TRANSITIONING CUBS INTO NSW HEALTH

During our community engagement, we realised that many children in Mount Druitt were not receiving developmental health checks, due to a range of barriers. This meant children were starting school with undiagnosed health and learning challenges, making it difficult for them to thrive.

In response, The Hive developed the 'Check Ups Before School' (CUBS) program. Led by a multi-disciplinary team – a Nurse, a Speech Pathologist and a Health Linker – CUBS delivered developmental assessments and associated health supports to children (0-5 years) at early learning centres and community sites.

We delivered the program as a pilot (2019-2022), with the goal of proving its worth and embedding it into mainstream service delivery. At the end of 2022, Western Sydney Local Health District (WSLHD) took over operation of the CUBS program, with The Hive continuing to play an advisory role on service delivery.

The NSW Government has acknowledged the impact of the CUBS program in its own policies. In late 2022, the Government began a pilot of early childhood developmental checks in preschools, expanding the program until it became statewide.

Today, all ECEC services in NSW are able to offer 4-year-old health and development checks, in partnership with their local health district.

THE HIVE - IMPACT HIGHLIGHTS

HEALTH INITIATIVES

Child Health Linker Program:

Supporting families to overcome barriers and navigate the health system, including psycho-social support and case management around a child's developmental needs.

Check Ups Before School (CUBS) Program:

Helped families to access developmental assessments ('blue book checks') before their child started school. We successfully transitioned this program into the NSW Health system (see previous page).

Willmot Paediatric Clinic:

A place-based approach in Willmot that gives families access to paediatric support, led by NSW Health after advocacy work from The Hive.

EARLY LEARNING INITIATIVES

Early Learning Linker Program:

Supporting families to navigate options and overcome barriers to access early childhood education and care (ECEC).

Early Educators Network:

Professional development and relationshipbuilding for early childhood educators across Mt Druitt.

Specialised support for early learners and their educators:

Supports ECEC services and playgroups with a high number of children with additional needs to access occupational therapy and speech pathology services - helping to increase the skills and capacity of their staff to support children.

Parent Story of Impact

Life does not feel like a fight anymore. She is responding to me when I put in place expectations, and she is enjoying me more. She feels more relaxed and her play and knowledge skills seems to be happening very quickly – she knows all her colours now.

COMMUNITY STRENGTHENING INITIATIVES

Community Leadership Program:

In partnership with local community organisations, The Hive is delivering a leadership training program for local Mt Druitt residents to develop their skills in leading change in their community. Areas of learning include interpersonal skills, conflict resolution, advocacy and communication.

Community Led Advocacy:

Working in partnership with local community to advocate to Government at all levels for positive change and investment in their community. This includes advocating for better public transport and more community infrastructure. This has led to a promise of a \$5 million upgrade of a local reserve.

Before I came here I was shy. I didn't want to talk to people... The lovely (people) here gave me encouragement. They helped me see that there's really good people in our community, who are willing to help others. This made me think that I could do this too.

My life is a thousand times better now. I've got community. I've got great women to support me. I try to support them as well. It makes me feel alive, really alive.

Community Cup is a friendly roundrobin soccer tournament that brings together corporate teams from the Macquarie Park business community for an afternoon of fun, friendly competition, and community spirit.

The Walkathon is a relaxed and enjoyable 5km walk that unites corporate teams and hundreds of participants for an afternoon of connection and camaraderie. Along the way, teams take on interactive, scavenger hunt-style challenges—creating a vibrant celebration of teamwork, wellbeing, and community spirit.

In 2024, United Way proudly expanded its successful Sydney event to Melbourne for the very first time. The enthusiastic response and strong support from the Melbourne business community have set the stage for an even bigger return in 2025.
